Message from our OSSA President, Dennis Jordan



As I sit here tonight, putting this letter together, it's not raining, it's not snowing and it's pretty much foggy in the RogueValley. So, I guess that means a late start to our winter season again this year.

I've had the opportunity to attend a couple of club Christmas parties in our local area. It never ceases to amaze me thegiving to charities to community organizations that the snowmobilers put out. What a great organization, and what a greatgroup of people.

Just to let everyone know what's going on around the state with OSSA. We have taken delivery of our three new cats. The first one was delivered to Harney County Snowmobile Club. They have two cats over there to groom a very largearea of our state grooming program. The next two were delivered on 1st of December. One was delivered to the KlamathClub, and the other to the Rogue Snowmobilers. We also moved the Rogue snowmobile cat up to Burnt River Club andthey received a very nice 2013 cat with low hours on it. All these clubs seem very excited to get their season (and theirnew equipment) started and to get grooming, so I guess it's almost time for a snow dance.

One exciting thing that's looks like it could be coming around soon, is in the Detroit Lake area. Most will remember thedevastating fire that went through the Detroit Lake area and shut down grooming at McCoy Creek for the last severalyears due to safety hazards with the trees. The Forest Service is considering reopening a portion of that area and if thathappens, the North Santiam snowmobile club will start grooming again in that limited area. It's kind of a wait-and-see asthe winter progresses but exciting that we will get some of our snowmobile riding area back.

Another exciting new area that we have ventured into is Avalanche Awareness. We are sponsoring classes and helpingwith getting instructors into the state to help us with instruction. Chuck Ehlert has done an amazing job getting ourAvalanche training off the ground. The folks over at the Wallowa Avalanche Center are also offering classes forawareness and AIARE level certification. One of the most exciting parts of our avalanche awareness is on the OSSAwebsite. You can go in there to the Avalanche page, and both read what the Avalanche forecast is and also find a placefor you the snowmobiler to record observations you may have had during your time on the snow that day in your area. This is a great tool for any of us that are backcountry snowmobilers riding in avalanche prone areas. So, thanks Chuck forthe great job on the Avalanche program and the website.

If you have not yet signed up for the OSSA 2024 convention, please do. LaPine Lodgepole Dodgers have a great programfor us with rides starting Tuesday January 23 through Friday the 26th with meetings on Saturday the 27th and the awardsbanquet that evening. If you've never ridden in the LaPine and Crescent Lake area, do yourself a favor, sign up for the convention and go on these guided rides. They have great social events planned Tuesday through Friday. Every eveningis a new adventure to meet fellow snowmobilers from across the state.

One very important item I want to mention is the plowing program with ODOT. Please be aware that the funding for ODOTis going down each year along with less plowing operators out on our highways. As we will all see when the winter stormsreally hit, there will be less plowing which means less Sno Park plowing. So please be patient with the ODOT operators. Also, make sure you contact your local state representative to air your concerns about how much funding is going toODOT and the Sno Park program.

As I always ask, Please, if you have an opportunity to see one of the great grooming team members, just say thanks foryour hard work and dedication to our sport!





We have two important updates to share! There is a newly released Northwest Forest Plan Noice of Intent and new details on the next Federal Advisory Committee meeting. Details on both below.

NEW NOTICE OF INTENT:

On December 18, 2023, the Pacific Northwest and Pacific Southwest Regions of the USDA Forest Service published in the Federal Register a Notice of Intent to amend the 1994 Northwest Forest Plan (NWFP) and prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). This launches and public comment period and we invite you to become engaged in the public scoping process for this project.

The Forest Service is proposing to amend the direction for the NWFP to address changed conditions and new information. The agency seeks to improve resistance and resilience to fire where needed across the NWFP landscape, support adaptation to and mitigation of climate change in the NWFP landscape, ensure tribal inclusion in developing and implementing plan direction in the NWFP, protect mature and old-growth forests, and support sustainable communities affected by forest management in the NWFP landscape. By strengthening habitat supported by mature and old growth ecosystems, the amendment seeks to enhance habitat protections for listed and unlisted wildlife to the wildlife-focused framework of the NWFP.

Comments can be submitted via web form or hard copy. Information on how to comment is provided in the Federal Register notice (88 FR 87393). Relevant documents, including the scoping letter, and information about how and where to submit your comments will be posted on our website at: https://www.fs.usda.gov/project/?project=64745.

NEXT FEDERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING:

In addition to the comment period associated with the NOI, the Northwest Forest Plan Federal Advisory Committee (FAC) will meet on Jan. 30- Feb. 1, 2024, at the University of Oregon, 1395 University St., Eugene, Oregon.

Details regarding the upcoming meeting, including how the public can provide information to the committee will beposted on the Forest Service's regional website at: https://www.fs.usda.gov/goto/r6/nwfpfac. The Federal Register meeting announcement can be found here: Federal Register :: Northwest Forest Plan Area Advisory Committee; Notice of Meeting.

Note that registrations for in-person oral comments or written public comments must be submitted by January 24, 2024 (11:59 p.m. PST). Electronically submitted comments strongly preferred. Comments received after the deadline will be provided to the Forest Service, but the Committee may not have adequate time to consider themprior to the meeting. All FAC meetings are open to the public and include opportunity for public comments.

The FAC was established by the Secretary of Agriculture as part of ongoing efforts to amend the Northwest ForestPlan. The purpose of the FAC is to bring together diverse perspectives representing the experiences of communities, experts, Tribes, and other interested parties across the Northwest Forest Plan landscape to inform ways that forest management can effectively conserve key resources while considering social, ecological, and economic conditions and needs.

The Federal Advisory Committee does not replace the public involvement process or the public's opportunity to engage directly with the Forest Service regarding Northwest Forest Plan amendment efforts during the planning process, opportunities such as the EIS scoping process is one such opportunity for engagement and comment.

The Northwest Forest Plan covers 24.5 million acres of federally managed lands in northwestern California, western Oregon, and Washington. It was established in 1994 to address threats to threatened and endangered species while also contributing to social and economic sustainability in the region. After nearly 30 years, the Northwest Forest Plan needs to be updated to accommodate changed ecological and social conditions.

Search And Rescue Training

Seven members of the MJSC SAR team trained along with sixteen LCSO SAR Cadre on 16 Dec 2023 for our Annual Winter Training Session. With limited snow but still cold, the training continued using side by sides and 4X4's. The SAR technology contiues to expand, LCSO SAR command center operated out of the clubs training room which is wired for TV coverage and radio booster antenna (range up to 10+ miles) to track each MJSC SAR team member in live time while traveling. This allows the LCSO SAR command team the ability to obseve where each team is and what areas and trails they have covered. The MJSC team pictured from left to right is Steve Duch (Club SAR lead), Bob Elliott, Randy Stroud (Big Lake), Wyatt Duch, Don Johnson, Christian Sammons (Club Groomer Lead) and Garrett Duch who also trained with the clubs new transport sled, AED, radio procedures to keep current. In the month of November the SAR team was certified to Oregon State SAR standards. 





Eagle Cap Extreme Sled Dog Race is looking for snowmobile riders

January 18-20, 2024

The Eagle Cap Extreme Sled Dog Race (ECX) is looking for experienced snowmobile operators to help support 200 miles of remote trail in Northeast Oregon. ECX is part of the Rocky Mountain Triple Crown and a qualifier for the Iditarod and Yukon Quest. We operate a large remote checkpoint that provides food and shelter to volunteers during the race. The race runs January 18-20, 2024 and starts near Joseph, Oregon.

Trail Boss:

The Trail Boss is considered a race official and has responsibility for the overall marking and condition of the trail. The Trail Boss coordinates with trail groomers during the race to ensure the race course is in suitable condition. Occasionally the trail boss will coordinate with the trail team to pack sections of trail with snowmobiles. The Trail Boss will join members of the trail team earlier during race week to mark the trail using an established method with mile markers, direction signs, and hazard signs. The Trail Boss will have support from our Trail Boss emeritus who served in this position for over 10 years before retiring after ECX 2023. The Trail Boss may recruit other riders, and/or work with returning volunteers. During the race, the Trail Boss will head the point team for the 200 mile race. The Trail Boss coordinates multiple point and sweep teams to ensure a safe event. The Trail Boss also works closely with the Race Marshal and the Ops Chief to ensure the highest level of safety on the trail.

Trail Team Member:

Trail Team members work with the Trail Boss on either point or sweep teams. Food and rest are provided at the Ollokot checkpoint which serves as a hub for several loops that comprise the 100 and 200 mile races. Trail Team members looking for a shorter commitment may consider volunteering for the 31 mile race that is run over 2 days and is about 6 hours on each day with the ability to return to town in between.

Snowmobile Support:

Snowmobile support operators assist in setting up and tearing down the Ollokot Checkpoint. The team travels about 2 hours from Joseph early January 17th and operators help shuttle personnel and equipment about 3-8 miles one way depending on the snow. On Saturday January 18th we have a need for operators to assist in the tear down, returning to town mid afternoon.

Volunteering for ECX is a rewarding experience!

Many volunteers return year after year. If you have a snowmobile and would like to ride for a purpose, please consider helping ECX! We will provide fuel during the race and food for all volunteers on the course. All snowmobile operators must have a snowmobile suitable for riding on groomed trails that occasionally get drifted during storm events, and the ability to transport the snowmobile to the race start. https://eagleca-pextreme.com/

Service Department Notes: TRAILER TIRES

Trailer tires are often exposed to heavy loads, therefore they do not last as long as truck tires, especially dual-axle trailers. Always check that your axle weight is loaded evenly, has the correct amount of tongue weight, and the air pressure is correct. Periodically check the lug nuts for proper torque.

Hefty fines for trucks failing to use tire chains in Oregon

Prepare for slippery weather travel now! Oregon law requires all commercial vehicles to carry chains whenever road conditions might require their use during your trip and signs are posted.

Oregon law requires that all vehicles over 10,000 pounds gross vehicle weight carry chains whenever their use may be needed or required. You may also be fined for not having an appropriate set of chains for your rig.

Start carrying chains before the weather takes you by surprise. And before every trip, visit TripCheck.com for current road and weather conditions and more on Oregon chain requirements.

Cost of trucks without chains

The estimated cost of delays caused by trucks failing to follow Oregon chain laws is over \$8 million a year — to the motor carrier industry and other highway users. When a truck loses traction, it can not only delay its delivery but also delay everyone else on the road behind a stuck truck.

Keeping Oregon moving is so important to motor carriers and all Oregonians that the Oregon Legislature raised the fine for trucks failing to use chains to \$880. That law took effect in September 2021.

If a truck is involved in a crash where failure to use chains is a factor, there could be other costs for the motor carrier — not to mention other travelers. Don't be the driver stopping miles of traffic behind you! The time it takes to chain up will get you to your destination faster and reduce the chances of a costly delay.

Wolverine Listed as Endangered

Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) is committed to deciding what needs Endangered Species Act protection by the end of FY 2024.

This week the FWS listed the Wolverine as Endangered. The Wolverine was listed as Endangered in 48 states. The listing does not include wolverines in Alaska and Canada, which number in the thousands.

This will impact many trails and riding areas. Snowmobilers were not granted any protection in the listing.

There will be a 60-day comment period. We will need to get all snowmobilers involved in submitting comments. We will work on suggested talking points in the coming days.

Safety First

Determining Group Ride Order and Spacing

- The most knowledgeable and experienced rider takes the lead. Trail leaders:
 - Guide the direction, pace, and length of the ride.
 - Alert the group to changing conditions and warn of potential hazards.
 - Avoid unnecessary risk by placing safety first.
 - $\circ~$ Do not allow reckless behavior such as "horse play" or passing within the group.
- The last position of a group, called a "trail sweep," is critical in maintaining proper spacing and leadership on the trail. This rider should be as experienced and knowledgeable as the trail leader.

Group Ride Spacing

Stay a safe distance behind the snowmobile ahead of you.

- Proper spacing is determined by speed, reaction time, distance, and the need to maintain visual contact.
- As a rule of thumb, calculate spacing distances using a reaction time of three seconds. As the snowmobile in front of you passes an object, count one-thousand-one, one-thousand-two, one-thousand-three. If you pass that same object in less than three seconds, you should allow more space.

Group Communication

- · Group riding requires good communication and visual contact.
- Visual communication requires proper spacing.
- To keep the group together, the trail leader should slow down or wait on the opposite side of a crossing when a stop is required. After crossing, the leader stops or slows the group to ensure that everyone knows the correct route.
- Hand signals should be used at all times when riding. When riding with a group, you give hand signals to the person behind you.
 - Before letting go of the handlebar to signal, make sure you will be able to maintain control of your snowmobile.
 - Don't make sloppy signals.
 - Make sure the person behind you can see your signals.
- Two-way headsets installed in helmets are useful for voice communication and are an effective way for the trail leader and the sweep to communicate. Several companies like BCA 2 way radios designed for snowmobilers' are very effective and a lot of folks are using their combination Garmin GPS and radio systems.
