

December President's Letter

Hello Fellow Snowmobilers,

Well, the 2022-2023 riding season has started, and in some parts of the state it has started in a big way! Snow Dance Worked!!!!!

As this is our last newsletter for 2022, I look back on OSSA's 50th anniversary, I think we had a pretty good year. We started the year with a great convention hosted by Diamond Lake. Our wonderful groomer operators put down over 35,000 miles of groomed trails across the state. We also found out that one of our wonderful groomer's, Bob Keller of the LaPine Lodgepole Dodgers was named the 2022 International Snowmobile Hall of Fame Groomer of the Year. At our April Board Meeting we bought 2 new cats for Central Oregon, with one more cat bought with RTP (Recreational Trails Funds) Grant for Tollgate Trailfinders. Each of our clubs with avalanche danger took delivery of "ARE YOU BEEPING?" signs (avalanche beacon stations) across the state. Signs were purchased with another RTP Grant. We have also been lucky to bring on Chuck Ehlert as our Avalanche Safety Coordinator to help us getting training out to our snowmobile community across the state. So... as we finish celebrating our first 50 years, it looks like are off to a great start for our next 50.

Some of you might have heard, ODOT is suffering from a huge staffing shortage. What does that mean to us? It means we may not see some of our snow parks plowed as often as we have in past. It could also mean we may not see some of the back roads to our favorite snow areas plowed as often either. The last word we got from ODOT was, if you know anyone that has a CDL or someone that would like a job we will help them get a CDL. Please let these folks know how much we appreciate the job they are doing.

A special thanks goes out to all of our great sponsors of our members only membership drive. These sponsors have made it possible to buy a great new snowmobile to give away to one lucky member with enough money left over to buy some fun raffle prizes to give away at this year's convention.

And... I hope all of you are planning on joining us at the **2023 OSSA Convention in La Grande from February 7th through the 11th.** Guided rides start on the 7th with our Annual Banquet the evening of the 11th. For more information and registration go to the OSSA web site.



Be mindful of avalanche conditions when recreating outdoors this time of year

WALLOWA COUNTY - With continued rain showers and an increase in temperatures recently the Wallowa Avalanche Center reminds that this could test the snowpack in the mountains.

Those who plan to recreate the outdoors should avoid steep slopes and terrain underneath those slopes. And if it begins to rain and/or you see rollerballs or pinwheels, they say it's time to exit the mountains.

Pinwheels and rollerballs of snow indicate the snow surface is getting wet and losing strength. They form when wind pushes snow across the ground, gathering it into a hollow cylinder.

Before you head out into the mountains check the Wallowa Avalanche Center's website for avalanche advisories https://wailowaavalanchecenter.org/

Due to impassable roads, the Harney County Snowmobile Club responded and rescued the man. Harney Emergency Medical Service was on scene to provide medial assistance.

Recent winter storms have brought early snow accumulation to the Malheur National Forest. In many areas, road and trail grooming has started earlier than in the recent past. With this news come notification that certain roads and trails will be blocked off by snow berms and will no longer be accessible to wheeled vehicles. Be aware that areas blocked off by a snow berm are not to be traveled on, except by Over Snow Vehicles. Respecting these restrictions will help maintain groomed surfaces for winter recreation opportunities.







Stranger rescues truck drivers stuck in snowstorm on Highway 230

DIAMOND LAKE, Ore. — A 31-year-old truck driver is sharing his story of a stranger who helped him get out of a very dangerous situation while traveling on Highway 230 during a snowstorm.

Paul Baker lives in Boise, Idaho, and drives a 53-foot flatbed truck throughout the Pacific Northwest. He said the actions of the man saved his life and allowed him to go home to his family.

"We were there for about three to four hours, around 10 p.m. We see the hero Jared, he came over coming up the hill, he had a pretty beefed up duly Duramax truck and he had a lot of lights on it, he was hauling two snowmobiles he had just come from snowmobiling in the boonies by himself," Baker said.

The stranger who helped Baker and another man who was stuck is named Jared Broadwater.



Baker explained if it was not for Broadwater's actions, he believes he would not be alive to see his family again.

"It was like an angel descending over the hill seeing all the lights and stuff," he said.

66 He just pulled me straight to the peak of the hill, where I could get more momentum, he did it so easy, he went back for the other guy, he did it like he knew what he was doing, very professional and very humble guy, it was a great experience without that I still might have been stuck who knows."





Volunteers that volunteer 16 hours or more qualify for a Northwest Forest Pass. Volunteer 250 hours or more to qualify for the America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass.

Annual Northwest Forest Pass

Benefits

- Honored at all Forest Service operated recreation sites in Washington and Oregon where a day use fee is required.
- Allows the pass holder use of recreation facilities at per-person sites. Other members in the party must pay the per-person fee.
- Allows the pass holder and any accompanying passengers in a private vehicle use of the recreation facilities at per vehicle sites.
- Passes are interchangeable between all members of the same household.
- Frequent visitors of national forests may save money by buying an annual pass.
- Reduces Forest Service administrative costs therefore allowing more dollars to go toward improvements at recreation sites.
- One free decal may be issued per Annual Northwest Forest Pass for visitors who have an open topped vehicle (Jeeps, etc.), or motorcycles. Decals are available at Forest Service offices only.

America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass

What are the benefits of the pass? The pass covers entrance and/or standard amenity fees on lands managed by the U.S. Forest Service, National Park Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Bureau of Reclamation, and Bureau of Land Management. Passes are valid for one year from the issuance date. More details about using the Volunteer Pass are at Recreation.gov.

How can I qualify for an America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass? Accrue 250 hours of volunteer service on participating Federal public lands, and you can receive an America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass in recognition of your efforts.

Simply coordinate tracking of your hours with OSSA and we can request the pass for you.





SEARCH & RESCUE TRAINING DAY

On 3 Dec 2022 the Annual Joint LCSO and MJSC SAR training day started with new deep snow, blue skies and energetic individuals to find two simulated missing skiers in the Ray Benson Snow Park area.

The training day consisted of Eight LSCO SAR team members, Eleven MJSC SAR team members, 2MCSO SAR members, 3 USFS staff, Fifteen LCSO SAR Cadets (High School Age students) and two volunteers from the Nordic XC Club.

After years of basic training with radios, maps, communication skills and improving coordination the group expanded this year to practice "finding" lost individuals.

Earlier in the day two manaquens dressed for the cold were hidden in the Snow Play area, only a few members knew where they were placed. The LCSO SAR team arrived and set up a Incident Command Center in the newly developed area in the MJSC training room inside the Groomer Shed, with a newly installed high powered antenna on top of the building and recently purchased long antennas for the hand held radios we obtained for communications.

Seven small teams were assigned separate areas to do a "grid" search to look for the victims. Clues were found and the area was narrowed down to a specific area, teams began to arrive and continued the search.



All the teams including the use of a LCSO SAR drone, a new MJSC SAR XC Skier and the Cadets from the LCSO arrived along with the seven MJSC SAR teams to sweep the area to find the simulated victims. The LSCO SAR Cadets packaged one victim for transport to Base. MJSC SAR transported the victim using a transport sled.

New skills where learned by all, some weak areas identified, team building between different agencies improved the coordination of a general search.



He thanked the returning groomers and welcomed three new groomer operators!




Corey and Kelly took the groomer out for a "let's make sure everything is working " short 15 mile run Thursday Dec 8th Beautiful evening for grooming.



Snowmobiler Hand Signals

Approved ACSA Snowmobiling Hand Signals

Hand signals are easy to use and can be a very reliable way to communicate while riding a snowmobile. They can be vital to safe snowmobile riding, so always make clear, very deliberate signals with your left arm that can be seen by other drivers behind you or on approaching sleds.





Left arm is raised from the shoulder and extended straight up over the head with palm of hand flat. Note that some riders may be indicate the STOP signal by extending their right arm instead of their left since the left hand is used for braking; therefore watch for and be prepared to stop for either signal.

Left Turn



Left arm extended straight out from the shoulder to point in the direction of the turn.

Right Turn



Bend your left arm at the elbow to shoulder height; with your hand pointing



Guide your snowmobile to the right while pointing to the right side of trail over your head, signaling to riders behind you that they should make sure they are riding on the right half of the trail and are yielding to on-coming traffic.

Slowing



Left arm extended out and down from the side of the body with a downward flapping motion of hand to signal warning or caution.

Sleds Following



Left arm is raised with elbow bent; with thumb pointing backward in hitchhiking motion, move arm forward to backward over your shoulder to advise approaching riders there are other sleds behind you in your group. Note that many riders may instead raise a number of spread fingers to indicate how many sleds are following in their group (if five or more, simply hold all five fingers up with fingers spread, or flash multiples of five). If traffic is heavy or if you're riding in the middle of a large group that is spaced fairly close together (next sled is clearly visible directly behind your sled), it is best to keep both hands on the handlebars and concentrate on driving your own snowmobile versus worrying about this signal since it should be quite obvious that other sleds are following.


Last Sled in Line



Take Your Brick Snowmobiling?

Who else remembers the brick phone? What is a brick phone, you ask?

Well, it was the predecessor to the "flip phone", you do remember what a flip phone is don't you? The brick phone was one of the first popular versions of a cell phone and it got it's name because, well, it's shape and weight was very similar to a brick. OK, now another question to those that remember the old brick phone ... how many of you guessed, back then, that brick was the beginning of your ability to carry a camera with you everywhere you went? Did any of you have any inkling, back then, that that brick would lead to having Google in your pocket, 24/7? And who in their right mind would have thought that the old brick phone was on the cutting edge of equipping you with a GPS when you went out in the woods on your **snowmobile?** What's that you say ... some of you are not using your cell phone for GPS when you're out in the woods? If that's you, be sure to finish reading this article because this app will give you great peace of mind while you're out recreating in the woods and may even save your life.

be used on multiple electronic maps and shared so that others can highlight that very same route on their map with your overlay. In the app that I am about to tell you about, an overlay is called a "layer" and layers can be turned on and off and each layer can be assigned a unique color and line weight.

The App that I want to tell you about is called Avenza and it works on both Apple and Android phones and tablets. Within the app there is a "store" where you can acquire georeferenced maps for just about any location. Some of the maps have a fee but many of the available geo-referenced maps at the Avenza store are free. Most likely, the current paper map of your "home" snowmobiling area is available at the Avenza store for free. And most likely, the geo-referenced map of the National Forest that you are going to visit this winter is also available at the Avenza Store for free (think La Grande area maps for January convention). Once you have found the map(s) you want and have downloaded them from the Avenza store to your phone or tablet, you no longer need cell service for these maps to show your location on the map. Your location on Avenza's geo-referenced map is shown as a colored dot and as you move about the trail system, so does your colored dot.

Avenza gives you the option to re-

the day you were there snowmobiling and overlay that track onto your hunting map. Bingo! You have your answer of having been snowmobiling in that area.

Avenza gives you the ability to overlay multiple saved tracks on the same geo-referenced map with each saved track having a unique color. Let's say you meet a buddy at the bar on your way home from sledding and you find out that he was riding in the same area you were. You share tracks, color your track red and his track blue and overlay both tracks onto the electronic map of the area. Bingo! You see where the red and blue tracks crossed and where you just missed seeing each other out on the trails.

Here's another great use for that saved track. You plan a SxS ride with some friends, each in their own SxS. It's a dry and dusty ride and nobody wants to eat dust from the rider in front of them so you're going to leave a three minute gap between riders. You share a saved track as your planned route with all the drivers and they overlay that track onto their own geo-referenced maps. Bingo! Nobody's getting lost, nobody's waiting for the guy behind them and, best of all, nobody is eating dust.

With Avenza, you don't have to travel a route to record it

you want your group to regroup at. With Avenza you can draw and measure on your electronic maps and you find locations by entering GPS coordinates.

Learning to use Avenza is pretty straight forward but the map store can be difficult to find stuff in. Sometimes it's easier to get the georeferenced maps from other sources such as the Forest Service or BLM websites and sometimes it's easier to find what you need in the map store if your buddy has given you the exact name of the map you are looking for. If you struggle with the app, there is undoubtedly a member in your snowmobile club that can give you a hand. Maybe that person could even give an evening class on how to use Avenza and how to find the maps you need.

So that brings us to the next question that I have for you fellow boomers that knew what a brick phone






Let's start off with a few terms. An App is a software program that's designed to perform a specific function for the user. There are thousands and thousands of apps designed for your phone and they are available at the Google Play store for Android phones or The App Store for Apple phones. A geo-referenced map is an electronic map that looks very much like a paper map but it has the ability to show your location on that map if your current physical location is within that maps boundary. And to make that geo-referenced map even handier, your location on that electronic map moves around on the map as you move around the universe. An "overlay" on a georeferenced map is like highlighting a route on a paper map with a yellow magic marker. The overlay is separate from the electronic map and can cord your track as an overlay or layer. In other words, you can keep an electronic record of your travels and save it for later use. Your recorded track can be shared so that others can overlay your track on their georeferenced map. You may have seen some of these recorded tracks on Facebook as many of the clubs are using a recorded track on Avanza to show where the groomer went last night. You can use these saved tracks to overlay onto different geo-referenced maps of the same area that you have saved on your device. Let's say you use one of your downloaded maps for snowmobiling and another downloaded map for hunting but both maps are of the same area. Let's say you go hunting and you vaguely remember snowmobiling in that exact same area last winter. Let's say you dig up that "saved track" from

... you can trace your planned route on the electronic map and save that tracing as a saved track. This would allow you to plan your ride and visually see your current location on the map as you travel over the planned route or deviate from that planned route. Let's say that you plan a route on the electronic map and when you try to ride that route you find an impassable section due to a fallen tree. You then see an alternate road on the map that will bypass the closed section and reconnect with your planned route farther down the line. Bingo! You still know where you are and you still know where you're going. You can also set "way points" on your


