Poker Run Courses

2 different courses for Snowmobile and Snowbikes Both courses will start and end at Diamond Lake resort.

Snowmobiles

Will run down West Lake trail to Hamaker shelter and back up Fish Creek. There will be a few different areas for some play and climbs along the way and on course check points. Total course is roughly 45 miles.

Snowbikes

Start off with a motocross style track to try everyone's skill around the snowbike track, then out towards Horse Camp to Dog Prairie, this is known as "Heaven's Snowbike Playground". This will have several miles of hillside riding and lots of tree area to ride and play. The entire route will be within a snowbikes' fuel tank range. carry extra fuel for extra play. This course is setup specifically for snowbikes and minimizes as much straight trail riding as possible. There will be a snowbike checkpoint out at Heaven's Snowbike Playground.

Friday Feb. 11th - Tickets \$14 (include a beer/wine and popcorn)

Sled Shows Palooza, Friday Feb 11th at 7pm we'll have this years new movies from Thunderstruck, Boondockers and etc.

Saturday Feb. 12th - Mt Bailey \$3000 - Entry \$15 and additional hands are just \$5.00 - Most people will play 3 hands (Entry and 2 extra hands) You can play as many hands as you want.

We are also offering our Super Card for \$2, this card is your Wild Card that can be played with any of your hands to make your best 5 card hand. (High hand winners will likely have a super card).

We are offering a trail lunch meatball sandwich for \$11.00 and can be packed in your cooker for a hot meal along the way.


Dinner is \$26 and will be served after our winner hands are turned in and raffle prizes.



Are you prepared for an Avalanche

OUR NEXT LEVEL EXPERIENCE

ON DECEMBER 29TH, my son Layton Valentine, good friend Bryce Kamerdula, and I started our 3 day riding clinic in Alpine Wyoming with Dan Adams and the NXT LVL Riding Clinic crew. This clinic was going to teach us technical-mountain riding skills and avalanche training through simulated exercises. We were all excited about this opportunity to learn from Dan and his crew.

We started the day with almost 4 hours of avalanche awareness and gear checks making sure we were fully prepared to enter the backcountry on snowmobiles.

Throughout the day we discussed the avalanche danger and avoided several slopes that had great potential for avalanche.

Toward the end of the day we were playing

path that had trees all around it and at the top of it which did not look threatening. We had played in this area for a few minutes and all of us were stopped in different locations in this drainage when Dan who was looking out spotted the avalanche way up above us and seen it coming down through the trees. Dan was quick to use the radio to inform everyone AVALANCHE, AVALANCHE-**DEPLOY YOUR BAGS!**

At that moment from my location I observed Layton's bag and one other bag deploy and a few seconds later he was facing the avalanche face on and a wall of snow 5-6' deep moving extremely fast hit Layton square in the chest with so much force it actually blew him out of the fall line of the avalanche and he ended up towards the side somehow 80 yards from where he was hit.



Key points from this event

- . The mountain does not care who you are!
- 2. Radio communication was key to early warning of avalanche and time to deploy avalanche backpacks.
- 3. Avalanche backpacks were key to no burial success of both riders.
- 4. Understanding how to use your gear is very important.
- 5. Riding with a group that has knowledge and proper gear is crucial.
- 6. Check your avalanche danger. We were in considerable avalanche danger, which we knew!
- 7. We are going to up our skills in Wilderness first aid because where we were in the backcountry there were no helicopters save us.
- 8. Communication devices such as Spot and satellite phone should be a must.





What happened next?

When the avalanche stopped Dan took control of the scene and provided the leadership to ensure everyone was accounted for and there well being as well as making sure the scene was safe from a 2nd wave.

In the end 2 riders were directly involved in the avalanche and the other 4 were on the side some in the wash of it. The proper use of avalanche airbags and radios absolutely saved lives on the mountain that day.

The rest of the trip: Day 2 consisted of avalanche training, and rescue. What we learned from this training was we really had no clue how to properly use our beacons and conduct a search and rescue properly. We all feel a lot more confident in this skill now.


Day 3: Bryce and myself continued riding and Layton got some experience working in the shop with his new buddy!

In closing, I've had some of the best experiences of my life snowmobiling as I'm sure all of you reading this can attest. We got our wake-up call to the potential risks associated with back country riding in December. Thanks to Dan and his crew at NXT LVL for making sure we were trained and I hope this story will motivate all of us to take avalanche preparedness **seriously**.



Greg here from the Rogue Snowmobilers,

The weather has been quite nice to us for the past few weeks down here in Southern Oregon. We have had two major snow events come through in the past few weeks giving us rare "champagne powder" events. The snow for at least a week was bottomless powder & we enjoyed the snow coming over our handlebars: D

At the OSSA 50th State Convention up at Diamond Lake Resort, the Rogue club lead a few guided rides during the week. We were excited to partner with our other fellow district 5 sister clubs to help put this event on.

We gathered up some additional supplies and tried to pull the cat out again on New Years Day. Sadly, we ended up breaking most of the recovery equipment (cables, chains, straps etc.) & needed to grab some bigger "beefer" equipment.

Tim from Timberland Logging stepped up big time and met us at the parking lot at Thousand Springs on Sunday, I/2 at about 9:30AM. A group of about 10 people all set off that morning after Tim brought up 250 feet of 5/8" cable. Many of the Rogue members were pleased to see our rigging setup the days prior wasn't wasted. We were doing it right; we just learned our rescue equipment was not up for the job.

After hooking up the bigger equipment in the same manor we did prior, it took a total of 37 seconds to pull our cat out with Roseburg's PB400.

Here's a few of the Rogue members that dedicated over 10 hours each to getting the snowcat out: Dennis, Dave, Carl, Greg, Bob, Hayden, Joey, Suzzanne, Mark D.

We're happy to report that our cat was un-damaged during the incident, Roseburg's cat has been returned to them for them to keep running, & our cat is fully operational once again.







We got a good amount of snow in December and the PistenBully has been out 8 times now. Fuel consumption has been really poor (about ½ a mile per gallon) due to the deep snow. The fuel consumption does improve dramatically once we get on trails that have already been groomed. This will make for a great base of snow, and now we just need to see more snow on top of it.

We would like to get a huge thank you out to Andre Ducharme, who has volunteered to keep the Bombardier groomer at his house. Andre's driveway is right at the end of the snowmobile trail south of Hyatt Lake. From there we can access Howard Prairie, which we hope will happen in the next 1-2 weeks. Andre has been running the groomer and also got all of the pre-season maintenance completed. Thank you, Andre!

We are very pleased to report that with the help of the OSSA, our groomer shed doors have now been replaced with insulated doors that fit properly. This is keeping the building much warmer. President Riblett and OSSA president Dennis Jordan were able to meet with a property owner to gain access to groom the Hyatt Lake area. The OSSA purchased 10 signs, and with the help of the BLM, will be putting the signs up on both sides of the trail as it passes through the private property to remind riders to stay on the trail. PRESS RELEASE:

WASHINGTON SNOWMOBILERS RESCUED NEAR FISH LAKE

On December 26th, 2021 at approximately 5:28 p.m., Sheriff Ash received a call from Brandon Christensen out of Washington State who said that he reached out to the Wallowa Avalanche Center regarding lost snowmobilers and was given his number. He told Sheriff Ash that a group of his friends had been snowmobiling and were lost in the Fish Lake Area. The lost subjects sent the caller a map with their coordinates using cellular devices. These coordinates showed the subjects to be in the Catherine Creek Area.

At approximately 5:43 p.m., Baker County Sheriff's Office Dispatch received an SOS alert from a **Garmin satellite device**. Garmin representatives relayed information that several snowmobilers, including one with a medical condition, were lost. Coordinates from the device were in the Fish Lake Area near Halfway. It was determined this was the same group the caller contacted Sheriff Ash about. Brandon had intermittent phone contact with one of the lost members and they were directed to stop and wait for help to arrive.

Sheriff Ash contacted Duane Miles with the *Panhandle Snowmobile Club* for assistance and responded to Halfway. Family members of the lost subjects, who were from Washington State, relayed there were five snowmobilers that were lost. The lost individuals were approximately 1.5 miles west of Fish Lake.

At approximately 9:10 p.m., members of the *Panhandle Snowmobile Club* located the subjects, identified as: John Rasmussen (Kennewick, WA), Alan Townsend (Burbank, WA), Mike Kelly (Burbank, WA), Steve Paget (Burbank, WA), and Jon Mecham (Kennewick, WA). All were cold and tired, but in good condition. The group had become lost when darkness, fog, wind and snow moved into the area and covered their tracks. They were unable to use GPS to locate the trail and could not find their way back to the Clear Creek Sno-Park. The group was located approximately 9 miles from Clear Creek Sno-Park.



Even the most experienced recreationists may find themselves in a situation where they need assistance. If you are an outdoor enthusiast, we encourage you to carry a satellite safety device. In this particular rescue, the cellular phone coordinates showed the subjects to be in the Catherine Creek area. *Had the subjects not been carrying a satellite device, they would not have been rescued that evening* as searchers would have responded to the wrong location. These devices are extremely helpful for first responders and may ultimately save your life.





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#1 Enemy

Ask most anyone involved with the creation and maintenance of snowmobile trails on private land and they will tell you the biggest threat to our interconnected trail system is trespassing. Snowmobile riders, more and more each year, venture off the groomed path in places where it is strictly forbidden. Like, illegal. Those who create the trails simply do not understand why there is such disregard, such disrespect, and such a casual attitude towards protecting and preserving what we have worked so hard to create over the past 50 years. It escapes common sense and logic.

I've been working on this issue for several years now. Thought it would be an easy subject to tackle, but it is much bigger of an issue than I first thought. It is actually a study of human behavior. There are so many reasons we have those who ignore the rules, like trespassing. Kind of like risk assessment behavior, there are so many rationales. Some don't know it is illegal. Some know but don't care. Some know but don't think it matters. Some figure there are no consequences. Some believe they are entitled. It is all over the map.

An alarming number of snowmobilers just do not see the problem. They truly believe what they are doing is a victimless crime, and therefore not a "real" problem. At least until they come back and find that trail is permanently closed. Some are locals, some are tourists. Some are young, some are old. Some are on trail sleds, some are on backcountry sleds. While we might be able to make some generalizations about those most likely to be offenders, it is not as clear cut as you might think or want it to be. One thing is for sure - fresh, untracked snow is too great of a temptation from some people to resist. Like the comedian Flip Wilson used to proclaim, "The Devil made me do it!" is about the only justification that makes sense. An inability to resist temptation. This alone should scare the hell out of us as a user group, as it paints a bleak future, indeed.

Snowmobiling's #I Enemy

People like to ride their sleds in fresh, untracked snow, I get that. We all like doing that. But doing it in sight of the groomed trail is not the place to do so! Taking your sled off into the fresh snow needs to be done away from the groomed trail system, but if you don't know how to get there or find that opportunity then we have a problem.

There is no silver bullet when it comes to a solution. Trails get closed and re-routed when the land owner finally gets fed up with people ignoring their wishes, trampling their crops and disrupting their livestock. The reason is actually irrelevant, as it is up to the good will of the land owner to let us route a trail on their land. If we can't appreciate what they offer, then we can go to hell. Maybe if more of the offending riders had to stand there and listen to the landowner throw us off their land then they'd start to understand. We beg and plead for one more chance, one more time, but they've been snookered once too many already and we are told to pull the signs, shut the gates and go elsewhere. Trails that have been in place since the 1970s are being closed. Fact. Just had one less than a mile from where I live. I will never again ride that section. If I could catch the hooligan that screwed this up I would love to have a few words with them.

What are we to do, give up? Of course not. We can do many things, but each action will only affect a portion of the root offenders. More signs will help some, but not all. More map data will help some, but not all. More education will help some, but not all. More consequences will help some, but not all.

First we need to make everyone aware of what actions are legal and not legal. (education)

Next we need to provide accurate data on what locations are legal and not legal. (signs, maps and screen data)

Then we need to have consequences for violation. No consequences, no change. (enforcement)

Often times it comes down to riders being lazy. They are too lazy to figure out where to go and how to get there. They just see the fresh open space next to the trail with no tracks and want to be "that guy". Doesn't matter if there are "Stay on Trail" signs, it's like they don't read English. Since we know they do, we can only conclude it is simple ignorance or entitlement.

Personally I believe the most damaging is the entitlement attitude, they do not respect the concept of private ownership and property rights. Public or private, does not matter to them. They truly believe they are entitled to use it all, like it should all be under common

ownership, or communism. Maybe this is the scariest part of all.

Some riders think we, the industry, the trail clubs, the state, should show them where backcountry riding can be done and how to get there. Just hand it to them on a silver platter. This also plays into the lazy argument, they are too lazy to study maps and learn the laws, too lazy to do some exploring and find their own little stash back in the woods. Anyone who rides out west knows this is part of the thrill, finding the little meadows and play areas that nobody else has been back into yet. Trust me, it isn't right next to the groomed trail!

Bottom line, there is no single solution to the problem, simply due to the multiple causes and attitudes. Some do not know any better. Some know, but do not believe the risk is great enough. Some know, but do not care. And, some believe it does not apply to them, that they are above the law, above the need to respect others. This is not a problem with snowmobilers, but with society as a whole, and that is a completely different problem.
