





Volunteer hours and miles Are Vital to OSSA

What is a snowmobile club volunteer?

A snowmobile club volunteer is a special person who dedicates their time, energy, and sometimes money to benefit not only their snowmobile club but others. This person is involved, helpful, charitable, selfless and always humble. Much of the time, the public has no idea what our volunteers do. So, let us share just a few things that they do.

They voluntarily maintain over 31,500 miles of multi-use trail each year. These trails benefit not only snowmobilers but crosscountry skiers, snow bikers, snow-shoers, and dog sledders. In the spring and fall, volunteers are busy cleaning trails and putting up trail markers to get ready for the next season. They cut wood and fill the shelters for all to use. They build bridges, shelters, re-roof existing grooming sheds, and do their own maintenance on their sno-cats. They voluntarily teach snowmobile safety classes and avalanche safety classes. They donate to charitable organizations such as Candlelighters, Wounded Warriors, Hospice, and Meals on Wheels just to name a few.

Our volunteers are the backbone of our organization. We could go on and on about all that they do. So, we want to humbly thank each and every one of you for your hard work and dedication to our wonderful organization.

Safety First

Determining Group Ride Order and Spacing

- The most knowledgeable and experienced rider takes the lead. Trail leaders:
 - Guide the direction, pace, and length of the ride.
 - Alert the group to changing conditions and warn of potential hazards.
 - Avoid unnecessary risk by placing safety first.
 - Do not allow reckless behavior such as "horseplay" or passing within the
- The last position of a group, called a "trail sweep," is critical in maintaining proper spacing and leadership on the trail. This rider should be as experienced and knowledgeable as the trail leader.

Group Ride Spacing

Stay a safe distance behind the snowmobile ahead of you.

- Proper spacing is determined by speed, reaction time, distance, and the need to maintain visual contact.
- As a rule of thumb, calculate spacing distances using a reaction time of three seconds. As the snowmobile in front of you passes an object, count one-thousandone, one-thousand-two, one-thousand-three. If you pass that same object in less than three seconds, you should allow more space.

Group Communication

- Group riding requires good communication and visual contact.
- Visual communication requires proper spacing.
- To keep the group together, the trail leader should slow down or wait on the opposite side of a crossing when a stop is required. After crossing, the leader stops or slows the group to ensure that everyone knows the correct route.
- Hand signals should be used at all times when riding. When riding with a group, you give hand signals to the person behind you.
 - Before letting go of the handlebar to signal, make sure you will be able to maintain control of your snowmobile.
 - Don't make sloppy signals.
 - Make sure the person behind you can see your signals.
- Two-way headsets installed in helmets are useful for voice communication and are an effective way for the trail leader and the sweep to communicate. Several companies like BCA 2 way radios designed for snowmobilers' are very effective and a lot of folks are using their combination Garmin GPS and radio systems.

The Oregon State Snowmobile Association provides snowmobile trail grooming in the state of Oregon with a 100% volunteer effort. Our volunteers are out on the snow almost every day grooming the trails to provide a safe and enjoyable experience for snowmobilers, snow shoeing, cross country skiing and other recreationalists.

A typical volunteer grooming day begins with arriving at the grooming shelter before sunrise to get the equipment ready for the day. Not only do our volunteers groom the trails but we also remove fallen trees and obstacles from trails. In addition we provide search and rescue assistance in emergencies. It's not uncommon for our volunteers to put in a 10 or 12 hour day grooming. It takes many many hours of training to become a primary groomer. Our groomers are trained in first aid, CPR, and equipment safety and maintenance.





Eagle Cap Extreme Sled Dog Race is looking for snowmobile riders

January 18-20, 2024

The Eagle Cap Extreme Sled Dog Race (ECX) is looking for experienced snowmobile operators to help support 200 miles of remote trail in Northeast Oregon. ECX is part of the Rocky Mountain Triple Crown and a qualifier for the Iditarod and Yukon Quest. We operate a large remote checkpoint that provides food and shelter to volunteers during the race. The race runs January 18-20, 2024 and starts near Joseph, Oregon.

Trail Boss:

The Trail Boss is considered a race official and has responsibility for the overall marking and condition of the trail. The Trail Boss coordinates with trail groomers during the race to ensure the race course is in suitable condition. Occasionally the trail boss will coordinate with the trail team to pack sections of trail with snowmobiles. The Trail Boss will join members of the trail team earlier during race week to mark the trail using an established method with mile markers, direction signs, and hazard signs. The Trail Boss will have support from our Trail Boss emeritus who served in this position for over 10 years before retiring after ECX 2023. The Trail Boss may recruit other riders, and/or work with returning volunteers. During the race, the Trail Boss will head the point team for the 200 mile race. The Trail Boss coordinates multiple point and sweep teams to ensure a safe event. The Trail Boss also works closely with the Race Marshal and the Ops Chief to ensure the highest level of safety on the trail.

Trail Team Member:

Trail Team members work with the Trail Boss on either point or sweep teams. Food and rest are provided at the Ollokot checkpoint which serves as a hub for several loops that comprise the 100 and 200 mile races. Trail Team members looking for a shorter commitment may consider volunteering for the 31 mile race that is run over 2 days and is about 6 hours on each day with the ability to return to town in between.

Snowmobile Support:

Snowmobile support operators assist in setting up and tearing down the Ollokot Checkpoint. The team travels about 2 hours from Joseph early January 17th and operators help shuttle personnel and equipment about 3-8 miles one way depending on the snow. On Saturday January 18th we have a need for operators to assist in the tear down, returning to town mid afternoon.

Volunteering for ECX is a rewarding experience!

Many volunteers return year after year. If you have a snowmobile and would like to ride for a purpose, please consider helping ECX! We will provide fuel during the race and food for all volunteers on the course. All snowmobile operators must have a snowmobile suitable for riding on groomed trails that occasionally get drifted during storm events, and the ability to transport the snowmobile to the race start. https://eaglecapextreme.com/

2024 KEN HAEVERNICK OSSA SCHOLARSHIP

OSSA scholarship is available to either graduating high school seniors or a person currently enrolled in a college or trade school full time (12 semester credits), either physically or online. Scholarships will be given to the winners regardless of other grants or scholarships that the students may receive.

Requirements are as follows:

- 1. The applicant or immediate family must be a paid member of Oregon State Snowmobile Association.
- 2. The applicant must submit the completed application form.
- 3. The applicant must submit a cover letter. This letter must include the student ID number and college/trade school name and the address to which a scholarship check would be sent.
- 4. The applicant must submit a resume detailing his/her involvement in snowmobiling as well as extra-curricular/volunteer activities.
- 5. The applicant must include an essay (essay subject on the application form). The essay MUST follow the format below to be accepted and should be sent in Word or Google Docs:
 - a. Minimum of 2 pages typed.
 - b. Double-spaced.
 - c. Font Times New Roman.
 - d. Font size -12 point.
 - e. Margins set to 1 inch for all margins (top, bottom, left side, right side).
 - f. Page numbers (if included) should be .5 inch from the top of the page (not within the 1" margin).
 - g. A header (for example, the essay question) can be added 1 inch from the top of the first page, and then enter a double space to begin your essay.
 - h. Do NOT use bold-faced type or other special settings.
 - i. If work is cited, add an additional "work-cited" page at the end of the essay. This information will NOT be counted as part of the 2-page minimum.
- 6. The applicable documents must be received via email at the OSSA Office by February 1, 2024. Please email to Lmahoney@oregonsnow.org using a subject line of OSSA Scholarship Application.
- 7. Any entry that does not meet ALL of these requirements will be disqualified. NO EXCEPTIONS.

MJSC SAR Team completed certification on Nov 4-5, 2023 from their Lead organization Linn County Sheriffs Office SAR

Eleven club members attended the course along with Linn County Parks Dept members and the Linn County Sheriff's Mounted Posse to either certify or recertify the Oregon Sheriff Type 4 Level Searcher requirement. Some new course material was updated by LSCO SAR like the trend is getting away from Search and more to Rescue due to the technogley with Cell Phone coverage and rescue notification devices like SPOT, with known locations, it is now the speed to rescue someone in the Winter environment to save lives. There is now an annual requirement that all First Responders need to obtain which is the protection and transport of injured individuals for possible "Spine, Neck and Back" injuries.

Another new item added to the education was the GAR (Green, Amber, Red) Card used to evaluate the "risk" of a SAR team going out on a mission. Nobody wants to go out and rescue a SAR team member.

The MJSC SAR team priority of coverage is the Ray Benson Snow Park area near Hoodoo, but is available to assist any County Sheriff in the State if called upon.

Hefty fines for trucks failing to use tire chains in Oregon

Prepare for slippery weather travel now! Oregon law requires all commercial vehicles to carry chains whenever road conditions might require their use during your trip and signs are posted.

Oregon law requires that all vehicles over 10,000 pounds gross vehicle weight carry chains whenever their use may be needed or required. You may also be fined for not having an appropriate set of chains for your rig.

Start carrying chains before the weather takes you by surprise. And before every trip, visit TripCheck.com for current road and weather conditions and more on Oregon chain requirements.

Cost of trucks without chains

The estimated cost of delays caused by trucks failing to follow Oregon chain laws is over \$8 million a year — to the motor carrier industry and other highway users. When a truck loses traction, it can not only delay its delivery but also delay everyone else on the road behind a stuck truck.

Keeping Oregon moving is so important to motor carriers and all Oregonians that the Oregon Legislature raised the fine for trucks failing to use chains to \$880. That law took effect in September 2021.

If a truck is involved in a crash where failure to use chains is a factor, there could be other costs for the motor carrier — not to mention other travelers. Don't be the driver stopping miles of traffic behind you! The time it takes to chain up will get you to your destination faster and reduce the chances of a costly delay.






