


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Choosing Your Steering Style: Wheel vs Sticks for Your New Groomer

When a snowmobile club orders a new Prinoth groomer, they get to pick their preferred steering interface: a steering wheel or "stick" / lever controls. The choice may feel subtle on paper, but in practice it can affect control, ergonomics, operator fatigue, and how intuitive the machine feels. In this article, we explore the pros and cons of each steering mechanism, which can be used as a conversation starter with your club before you buy your next machine.

Steering in Snow Groomers

Before we dig into the pros and cons, a bit of context:

- Snow groomers are driven by hydrostatic hydraulic systems, with each track (left and right) driven independently. Steering is achieved by differential track speed (one track moving faster/slower relative to the other).
- Whether you use a steering wheel or levers, the operator's inputs get translated into hydraulic commands to modulate flow/pressure to track drive motors.
- Many modern groomers (including Prinoth's) support "cruise" or fixed-RPM modes, decoupling speed control from steering input, which changes how the two steering styles feel.

With that in mind, here's how the two steering philosophies compare.

Steering Wheel Advantages

1. Familiarity & Intuitive Feel

Many operators are already accustomed to steering wheels (cars, trucks, tractors). Turning left causes left, turning right causes right — the mental model is simple.

This can shorten the training curve, especially for operators coming from wheeled steering backgrounds.

2. Precise, Low-Effort Fine Adjustments

With a well-tuned hydraulic assist / power steering system, small corrections can be made with minimal effort.

3. Excellent for Holding a Line

For long straight runs or slow transitions, the wheel allows the operator to "steer into" a trajectory gently, holding a heading with minimal input.

Wheel Challenges

1. Less Direct Feel / Response

Because the wheel is an indirect interface (turn wheel \rightarrow controller \rightarrow hydraulic system), there can be a lag or damping. In soft, uneven snow, that "buffer" might reduce responsiveness compared to direct lever control.

2. Mechanical Limits

You can't spin the wheel infinitely; the mechanical travel may be constrained. In tight turns or sharp adjustments, one may reach the stopping point of the wheel.

3. Complexity & Maintenance

More mechanical parts (steering column, bearings, linkages) may increase maintenance or susceptibility to wear.

4. Cognitive Disconnect in Some Conditions

Some operators feel that a wheel doesn't "feel like a machine" — they lose the visceral connection of direct control.

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
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Steering Levers / Sticks

In this style, two control levers (one for each track) are pushed forward or pulled back, either independently or in a coordinated fashion, to modulate speed and direction.

Advantages

1. Very Direct, Responsive Control

Because each lever directly controls forward/back pressure to each track, the operator often enjoys heightened sensitivity and responsiveness. Track differential is more directly manipulated.

2. Aggressive Maneuvering & Tight Turns

In tight terrain or steep switchbacks, the operator can apply more aggressive differential commands (e.g. holding one lever slightly back, the other forward) in an instant. This can aid sharper turning, pivoting, or tight track corrections.

3. Good for Experienced Operators

Those who "feel" the machine often prefer sticks — it gives them the leverage and responsiveness they want. Many long-time groomer operators see stick cats as more precise or connected.

4. Simplicity & Robustness

Fewer parts in the mechanical linkage of steering (no steering column, less complex joints) mean less to maintain or calibrate. In cold, vibration-heavy applications, this can be an advantage.

Challenges

1. Higher Learning Curve for New Operators

For someone not familiar with dual-stick steering, coordinating smooth curves without jerky transitions can be tricky. Operators may overcorrect, producing "zig-zag" behavior.

2. Operator Fatigue / Arm Strain

Holding and moving the levers continuously, especially on long shifts or rough terrain, can strain the forearms or shoulders more than a wheel movement might.

3. Less Natural for Straight-Line Holding

Maintaining a straight path may require continuous micro corrections — the operator can't "rest" a hand on a wheel and drift slightly.

Which One Fits Best for Your Operation?

Here are factors to consider when selecting your steering style on a groomer:

1. Operator Profile & Experience

If your operator pool includes many who have driven trucks, tractors, snowmobiles, etc., wheel steering may seem more accessible. If you have veteran groomers used to stick cats, lever style may feel more natural.

2. Terrain & Grooming Strategy

In tight, technical terrain (steep gullies, tight switchbacks, narrow trails), the extra responsiveness and sculpting capacity of levers can shine. For long, open trails, wheel control may allow smoother straight lines and reduce fatigue.

3. Maintenance Philosophy

If you prefer fewer moving parts, simpler calibration, and a robust setup, levers may offer lower long-term maintenance overhead. However, both systems in modern Prinoth groomers are built to high durability standards.

Wheel or sticks? There's no wrong answer!

At the end of the night, it's more about the operator's preferences than anything else. We recommend that clubs discuss the pros and cons, then get in a demo machine before they decide. There is a learning curve in all grooming operations, and sticks might just be the answer for your club.

Typical Grooming Day:

5:00 am Wake up.

6:00 am Drive 90 minutes up to the mountain.

7:30 am Prepare the Grooming Machine for the day.

8:00 am Begin Grooming the trails.

8am to 6pm Groom the trails, remove fallen trees, remove moguls, make roads through snow drifts.

6:00 pm After grooming 50 to 60 miles return to Groomer Barn and begin refueling and cleaning the Groomer.

7:00 pm Head for home.

8:30 pm Arrive home and crash.

Why should I register my snowmobile?

Did you know that registering your snowmobile helps fund the groomed snowmobile trails in Oregon?

The Oregon State Snowmobile Association (OSSA) receives money from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT). The money comes from the state gas tax, snowmobile registration fees and snowmobile title fees. It is put into a fund managed by ODOT. OSSA has a contract with ODOT to facilitate trail maintenance which includes grooming the many miles of snowmobile trails in the state of Oregon. The percentage is based solely off of how many snowmobiles are registered in the state of Oregon. The more snowmobiles that are registered the more money OSSA gets to groom the trails. So, if you enjoy riding your snowmobile on the many miles of groomed trails in the state of Oregon. Please register all of your snowmobiles, whether they run or not.

Registration for a snowmobile is only \$5 per year for 2 years.

A fine for no registration is \$115.

1st Place Division Winner – \$250



I attended the Oregon State Snowmobile Association board meeting on August 23, 2025. The association has regional directors as well as grooming directors for each region. Discussion rotated through the group, sharing updates and notable matters from the previous season along with future endeavors. With it being the end of summer, there had not been a whole lot of recent club activity. Although, there was a common theme with maintenance for shelters, snowcats, parking lots, etc. As problems were shared there were always other members who offered help or solutions.

OSSA owns a large fleet of snowcats and grooming equipment. Our clubs maintain hundreds of miles of trail in remote areas and safety of our operators is a high priority. We discussed and agreed to purchasing Starlink systems for every snowcat to ensure operators will always have communications to those back home. This was a big move and investment by OSSA. I think it is a great use of technology and funds, as safety is priceless.

OSSA is looking to add two positions, a safety coordinator and an avalanche safety director. The topic of insurance came up as it is a complicated subject within our spreadout operation. The association has a policy and luckily has not had to use it.

We discussed submitting a plan to potentially buy two new snowcats and a grooming drag. These are both wear items that also continually improve as technology advances. We also approved purchasing of a new trimmer/ brushing machine that attaches to any of our snowcats and allows for trail cleaning from the cat, it's a mechanized hydraulic saw on an extendable arm. This will be shared by all snowmobile clubs in Oregon.

OSSA has opened a physical office location in Central Oregon. They also added a new employee to help with administrative duties and social media. We also have a public lands coordinator who keeps an eye on Forest Service updates and land use changes. OSSA wants to host avalanche safety courses, which is something we have a shortage of in Oregon. There are many ski based avalanche education options but the motorized based training has many differences and there are limited options for motorized courses here. That's where I brought up a connection I have with Stable Mtn out of Idaho and now it looks like they will be making a trip to Central Oregon for a level 1 and rescue avalanche course.

One of the more exciting topics was the OSSA convention which will take place at the end of January. Based out of southern Oregon, there will be several days of planned rides, dinners, and a banquet. Levi Lavallee will be visiting from Minnesota to attend and ride with us.

This was the first OSSA board meeting that I have attended and I learned a lot more about how our system operates. It was great to see all those involved and learn about the important topics at hand. It was also beneficial to hear about the other clubs and what they do, which I can use as inspiration at my home club, Moon Country Snowbusters.


Another project this summer was a July campout with the Harney County Snowmobile Club doing trail maintenance.



The WAC is excited to announce that we have installed 2 new weather stations in anticipation for this season.

These weather stations were purchased through a grant from our friends at the Wildhorse Foundation.

We placed one near the Bone Springs Warming Shelter, and the other on Flagstaff Butte. These stations will significantly enhance the Wallowa Avalanche Center's forecasting capabilities by providing real-time data on snowpack conditions and weather variables. This increased coverage will improve the accuracy of forecasts, allowing for timely and informed decision-making for back-country travelers, and ultimately enhancing safety in avalanche-prone areas.

We thank the Wildhorse Foundation for their support of the Wallowa Avalanche Center's mission tokeep winter backcountry travelers safe in the mountains of Northeast Oregon through education, avalanche advisories, mountain weather information and observations.

Each year, the Wildhorse Foundation offers grants to eligible nonprofit, government, and Tribal organizations within the homeland area of the Cayuse, Umatilla, and Walla Walla people. Also eligible for funding are Tribal government agencies or Indian charitable organizations with their base of operations within Oregon, as well as national or regional Indian organizations. The Wildhorse Foundation has awarded a total of over \$18 million in grant funding since its establishment in 2001. If you live in another state or for some other reason don't want to join a local snowmobile club you are welcome to become an OSSA only Member.



Shutdown Impacts Forest Fires

As the government shut downdrags on, some GOP members of the HouseAgriculture Committee warn that reduced forest management could increase the risks of intense wildfires. Government funding lapsed 10 days ago and continues with no end in sight.

The Department of Agriculture noted in its funding lapse plan that "significant agency activities that will cease" include measures to reduce fire risks, a point some Republican House Agriculture Committee members are hammering as they oppose the shutdown. "Wildfire agencies need every tool at their disposal to reduce fuel loads, protect property, and save lives," Committee on Agriculture Chairman and Republican Pennsylvania Rep. Glenn Thompson told the Daily Caller News Foundation. "The Democrats' reckless shut down threatens to sideline critical prevention work, leaving our rural communities at risk.

BLM

While only a quarter of the Bureau of Land Management's staff has been placed on furlough so far during the federal government shutdown, there are signs that might change soon.

BLM's contingency plan calls for roughly 75% of its 9,250 employees to continue working, andmany are getting paid with non-appropriated funding, such as carry over funds or money collected by fees. Only 2,400 BLM employees have been furloughed.

But that is already changing for some of the 4,000 employees that BLM's contingency plan lists as either on an "exempted" or "excepted" status, which means, respectively, that their ongoing work is paid for through fees or other available money or they are authorized to work without pay during the shutdown because of their positions, such as people in law enforcement.


