So he, his wife Sally, Ray and Shirley Benson, Frank and Mary Ann Ellis, Walt and Dixie Haring, Clint and Nancy Peterson, Ron Levine, Wally Gibson, Major and Carla Defoe, Buck Herman and Ray Brandt started the Oregon State Snowmobile Association, to protect Snowmobiling in the state of Oregon for future generations to come.

Ken is responsible for helping write legislation for the Sno Parks program, the licensing Ken was to be honored at the OSSA Convention in Diamond lake this past January, but due to Covid, and a bit of limited mobility these days, Ken was not able to attend. The OSSA Board was still kind enough to give him a nice award for his many years of service to the association and countless hours spent turning it into what it is today. My Dad, Gene Benson and I were able to catch up with Ken recently and give him his award. He's incredibly happy with the job everyone does to keep the association going and thriving today.

He truly is one of the greatest people I've had the privilege of meeting, and I can't thank him enough for everything he's done.

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International Snowmobile Day October 29, 2022

The snowmobile manufacturers are pleased to announce Snowmobile Day, happening October 29, 2022. Snowmobile Day is a day to celebrate the snowmobiling community and begin preparations for the upcoming season. Snowmobile clubs, local dealers, associations, and snowmobile groups are invited to participate.

Snowmobile Day is being patterned after the successful "Snöskoters Dag", held in Sweden for over 45 years. The celebration in Sweden started in the 1970s and expanded rapidly through the 1980s as snowmobiling in Sweden expanded. The success of the event is traced to creating a fun family party, with involvement from clubs, associations, media, dealers, and other industry stakeholders.

Snowmobile clubs are encouraged to begin the season with a party that might include games activities, and more. A "Show and shine" event featuring vintage and custom snowmobiles, towing and groomer vehicles could be another type of activity planned. Safety training, maintenance and winter check-ups for snowmobiles and trailers are other activities clubs and associations might hold during a Snowmobile Day celebration.

Snowmobile Day should be a fun, family festival type event, where BBQ, refreshments, music, and an open house can get snowmobilers excited for the upcoming season.

Snowmobile Clubs are encouraged to participate in the activities and serve food, coordinate special events, conduct safety classes, sell trail, riding permits, and registrations. This is a great opportunity for clubs and associations to increase membership and recruit volunteer for trail activities.

Snowmobile associations and clubs are encouraged to contact local Chambers of Commerce, Visitor and Convention Bureaus, and regional media to support and help with a local event.

Planning a Snowmobile Day celebration is a perfect opportunity to bring enthusiasts together in kicking off the season and enjoying the snowmobile family lifestyle.

Polaris Issues Stop Ride /

Number of affected vehicles: Around 230,000 units globally

Number of incidents: Polaris has identified 30 reports of fuel tank ruptures, including 16 incidents of fire and one report of injury.

Stop Sale for Model Year 2021-2023 MATRYX, 2015-2022 AXYS, and select Model Year 2013-2014 Trail Performance (Pro-Ride) snowmobiles

Polaris has determined that with degraded fuel and especially after extended storage, Model Year 2021-2023 MATRYX, 2015-2022 AXYS, and select Model Year 2013-2014 Trail Performance (Pro-Ride) snowmobiles may pose a risk of fire due to electrostatic discharge (ESD) inside the fuel tank. Under specific conditions, vapors may be ignited inside the fuel tank, posing a potential injury hazard to consumers. Consumers should immediately stop using the impacted units. Polaris is currently evaluating a comprehensive action plan to correct this concern at no cost to consumers and will contact affected consumers once determined. DO NOT attempt any repairs yourself. If a rider needs to start their snowmobile, they must make sure the fuel tank is full and, if it is not, then they need to add fresh gasoline to fill the tank.

Polaris is notifying dealers and contacting registered owners directly. Polaris has reported this matter to the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Volunteers that volunteer 16 hours or more qualify for a Northwest Forest Pass. Volunteer 250 hours or more to qualify for the America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass.

Annual Northwest Forest Pass

Benefits

- Honored at all Forest Service operated recreation sites in Washington and Oregon where a day use fee is required.
- Allows the pass holder use of recreation facilities at per-person sites. Other members in the party must pay the per-person fee.
- Allows the pass holder and any accompanying passengers in a private vehicle use of the recreation facilities at per vehicle sites.
- Passes are interchangeable between all members of the same household.
- Frequent visitors of national forests may save money by buying an annual pass.
- Reduces Forest Service administrative costs therefore allowing more dollars to go toward improvements at recreation sites.
- One free decal may be issued per Annual Northwest Forest Pass for visitors who have an open topped vehicle (Jeeps, etc.), or motorcycles. Decals are available at Forest Service offices only.

America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass

What are the benefits of the pass? The pass covers entrance and/or standard amenity fees on lands managed by the U.S. Forest Service, National Park Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Bureau of Reclamation, and Bureau of Land Management. Passes are valid for one year from the issuance date. More details about using the Volunteer Pass are at Recreation.gov.

How can I qualify for an America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass? Accrue 250 hours of volunteer service on participating Federal public lands, and you can receive an America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass in recognition of your efforts.

Simply coordinate tracking of your hours with OSSA and we can request the pass for you.

Advice on Pre-Season Groomer Prep from Your PRINOTH Team

Advice on Pre-Season Groomer Prep from Your PRINOTH Team

Winter is around the corner. Is your club's groomer ready to hit the trails?

If you're like most clubs that rely on volunteers for this work, I'm guessing the answer to that question is no, not quite yet. Fall is the time when we're tying up loose ends, and all the heavy work is complete, but the question always arises... How is it that we wait and wait for the snow to fall, and when it finally does, it's a surprise? This year, let's get ahead of it!

Maintaining your groomer is a never ending, yet rewarding chore. Just because we call it "Summer Maintenance" doesn't mean the job is done when winter arrives.

We sat down with the team from PRINOTH to gather some service tips that every snowmobile club can use to help get their grooming machines ready for the winter season. The first thing they said was, "when we say to do a pre-season check, that doesn't mean the night before it snows! We're all busy, but servicing a grooming machine isn't just a nice to have, it's a must do."

Machine Walk-Around

The first step before even thinking about heading out on the trails, is the machine walk-around. Before you fire up the machine be sure to check fluid, leaks, lighting, tracks and undercarriage, all-over condition of the equipment and where you spend all your time – the cabin.

- 1. Fluid levels fill 'er up before each shift!
 - Make sure you know what each fluid compartment has in it and if it's topped off. Have fluids and filters on hand. When was the last time a specific fluid was changed? Hydraulic, drive system, gear box, diesel fuel, DEF/AdBlue, antifreeze, engine oil
 - \circ $\;$ Most importantly, know and stick to the manufacturer's recommended intervals.
- 2. Leaks (this one is a must)! An inspection of your hoses has to be apart of your walk around as the hydraulic fluid is the life blood of your machine. It's also #1 for landowners and our friend the environment. Let's face it, leaks make a huge mess and are almost impossible to clean up, so stop them before they start. Catch leaks before they catch you (in the middle of nowhere).
- 3. Lighting it's dark out there and you don't want to have to use your phone's flashlight to get back to home base. Overall lighting is not just for your protection, but also (and maybe more importantly) the other person on the trail.
 - Clubs will sometimes mount after-marketing lighting systems. Be sure these are installed by a qualified technician.
- 4. Tracks and undercarriage/chassis
 - Perform a thorough inspection of the tracks checking for bent/broken grousers, torn or weathered belting, and make sure you are running the proper tension. This adds to the life of the tracks and minimizes wear.
 - Inspect and grease your bogey wheels, paying close attention to suspension parts. These are a wear item and require service from time to time.
 - Inspect the blade push frame where it meets the chassis and all other joints and surfaces for cracking or bent parts, this goes for the rear lift frame as well.
- 5. Overall condition of the groomer and drag or tiller
 - If you are pulling a drag make sure to inspect your connection point whether it is a pintle connection or fifth wheel/gooseneck for cracking or bent parts. If your drag is fitted with lighting inspect the plug and wiring as the cold weather can have an adverse effect on electrical components.
 - Take a peak for critter nests. Those little buggers can wreak havoc on wiring and other vital components.
- 6. Cabin Before embarking on your journey do a quick look around the cabin to be sure it is clean

and everything is in working order: seat adjustment, seat belt, switches.

- Do you have your radio? Enjoyment and safety! It's nice to have contact with the outside world and to be able to call if the bear stirs from its winter slumber.
- Heat. It's not an option; you don't want to become an icicle.
- Blade and drag/tiller controls make sure they're functioning as intended.
- Clear the windows and mirrors, double check the heated wipers. You'll be glad you can you see outside.

Walk through the machine back to front, top to bottom, outside to inside.

It may seem tedious, but spending a few minutes before getting in the machine can save you hours in the long run! Before the start of the season, do this same thing, but with a notepad and your club officers for an official pre-season review. Document what's damaged, needs to be replaced or updated, and who is responsible for completing the task. For example, change your oil and filters before starting the season so when the snow falls your groomer will be as ready as you to get out there!

During the season, keep track of the machine condition

With your grooming operators and club officers, make a plan for how to communicate what's happening with the machine. Write it down and stick a note to the windshield, then add to it anytime you notice something. This is especially important in clubs where multiple people are grooming so you can share information with each other. Just because you know doesn't mean Dave does. (Hey man, Dave's not here!). More often than not, your manufacturer will offer summer parts and service specials and have time to work on your machine during the off-season.

Words of wisdom: Don't wait, time has a tricky way of sneaking up on you. And remember a little grease goes a long way when it comes to the dependability and life of your cat.

Reach out to your local PRINOTH rep for service questions and grooming tips.





It's about that time of year again, mornings are colder and I'm making sure I have what I need for a BIG SNOW season (I hope). Part of the pre season work involves checking my rescue gear for serviceability. New set of batteries for my beacon and a close look at my shovel and probe for cracks is where I start. Over the next few weeks, I will rebuild my tunnel bag and ensure I have my pack ready with overnight essentials.

This year OSSA will make available to clubs an avalanche basics course which is about a 45 minute presentation on the basics to avalanches, how they occur and how we should operate in and around avalanche terrain. We also have a 3-4 hour rescue basics class that includes classroom instruction and a hands on rescue practice period. In this class we will cover beacon search basics, shoveling and probe usage. These classes are intended to provide review for the more experienced riders as well as a good introduction for new members to our snowmobile community. These classes are made available by contacting me at <u>ehlertce@me.com</u>. These classes are intended to be taught by the local clubs to their members. Any club member who has attended a formal avalanche course or is an experienced backcountry rider and has been operating routinely in avalanche terrain should feel comfortable teaching the courses. I am also available to visit your club and provide the instruction. I would only ask that you identify a prospective instructor to teach along side me so they can continue the training for your club in the future. I'm also available for zoom classes and any other way you or your club would like to present the instruction.

A key component to our program is encouraging our members to attend formal A3 certified avalanche training courses. We are also in the final planning stages for an A3 certified two day level one motorized course and a one day rescue course to be taught in Bend this winter. Details to follow, but please mention this to your clubs and reach out if you have questions or

are interested. It will be a limited availability class, however we are lucky to have one of the best motorized



avalanche courses in the United States offered right here in Oregon. All levels of motorized avalanche courses can be taken from Wallowa Avalanche Center in Northeast Oregon. A beautiful place to ride and and an incredible training center with outstanding instructors. Here is the link to course ex (<u>https://wallowaavalanchecenter.org/cl</u>

Groomer Volunteers Work Party

We held our first club meeting of the year on September 13th at Willy's Pizzeria. Dan Riblett gave us all an update on our grooming program for last season, Dennis Jordan updated us on what is going on at the OSSA, and we set our schedule of events for this season.

OSSA President, Dennis Jordan, informed us that the OSSA purchased 3 new cats for this grooming season, and 2 new cat sheds were built to protect the cats. Grooming clubs throughout the state groomed a total of around 49,000 miles last season. Thank you to all the groomer operators throughout the state!

The 2023 OSSA convention will be held February 7-11th in La Grande, OR. The OSSA is excited to be giving away an 850 skidoo with a 165" track at the convention. You cannot buy tickets for the sled. You earn tickets based on participation. The earlier you renew your OSSA & club membership, the more tickets you get. You also get tickets for participating in the OSSA convention. There are other ways to earn tickets for the raffle. Please look at the OSSA website for more information (oregonsnow.org).

Dennis also asked me to send a special thank you to Rod Ambers for the excellent job he did putting a wrap on his snowbike. Rod donated his labor to put on a wrap as a prize for our end of the year banquet last April, and Dennis won the prize.

Our grooming total for last season was 2,222.1 miles, with a total of 247 trees removed from the trails. Below is a list of club volunteer accomplishments for the 2021-2022 season:

Fremont/Winema National Forest: 1342.6 miles groomed (60.4%), 260 cat hours, 520 person hours, 160 trees removed

Rogue/Siskiyou National Forest: 563 miles groomed (25.3%), 108.9 cat hours, 218 person hours, 62 trees removed

Lakeview BLM: 101.3 miles groomed (4.5%), 19.4 cat hours, 39 person hours, 0 trees removed

Medford BLM: 216 miles groomed (9.7%), 41.7 cat hours, 83 person hours, 25 trees removed

Club volunteers also had 109 hours of trail maintenance with 12 miles of trails brushed. We totaled 92 hours of warming hut shelter maintenance, including wood cutting for the shelters. We totaled 52 hours of grooming shed maintenance & repair, 189.5 hours of groomer maintenance, 9 hours of meetings, and 26 hours of safety sessions. Club members volunteered to drive 5,500 miles to accomplish all these tasks. Thank you so much to everyone who participated in these club functions.

We are very pleased to report that our club reached 103 family memberships by the end of the season last year. We have reached 47 paid memberships as of September 13th. Please work on getting your dues paid for this season.

We would like to thank Kari Adams for volunteering to take over the Treasurer position for this season. She is taking over for Monica Miller, who served as the club treasurer for several years. Thank you, Kari & Monica, for your service to the club.

Our next general club meeting will be October 11th, 2022 at the Mazatlan Grill. We will meet to eat dinner at 6 p.m. and the meeting will start at 7 p.m.

Snowmobile Buyers Guide

Whether you are buying a new or used snowmobile, our goal is to help you purchase the snowmobile that will give you the most value for your dollar. We want you to not only make the best purchase possible, but also have the best snowmobile experience with your purchase.

Snowmobiles have been around for almost 100 years. The technology of snowmobiles gets better every year. Basically, the newer the better.

Safety

The #1 rule of snowmobiling is NEVER RIDE ALONE!

Reasons to buy a snowmobile:

Snowmobile riding season usually takes place November through April. That's 6 months worth of riding fun!

- You can join a local snowmobile club and meet new friends.
- You don't ever have to buy a lift ticket to snowmobile!
- Unlike snow skiing, you won't get cold waiting for or sitting on a chair lift.
- Snowmobiles have windshields, heated handgrips and heat for your feet to keep you warm.
- Snowmobiling is a very safe family sport. Anyone from young to old, athletic to handicapped can ride a snowmobile.
- Snowmobilers care about our environment. Snowmobilers leave no trace.
- Do you get depressed in the winter? Snowmobilers always have a smile on their face when they are snowmobiling! The scenery is spectacular.

Should I buy NEW or USED?

Obviously a new snowmobile would be great, but not everyone can justify a new snowmobile. If you don't want to invest in a new snowmobile here are some tips on purchasing a used snowmobile.

- Because you're going to depend on your snowmobile for reliable, safe enjoyment, the service history is a top priority when choosing the right sled. Be sure you know it was taken care of properly
- If you don't know the person you are buying it from, take it to your local dealer to have it inspected before purchasing. Just like an automobile, snowmobiles need repair and maintenance to be reliable. It's very possible to buy a used snowmobile for \$2,000 only to find out that it needs \$3,000 worth of repairs.
- How many miles does it have? At 10,000 miles, most snowmobiles are
- basically worn out (similar to an automobile with 200,000 miles).
- Is the odometer correct? Odometers can easily be tampered with or replaced on snowmobiles. For this reason, if you don't know the seller it's especially important to have it inspected at your local dealer.
- Nada Guides can give you used snowmobile values, but remember the ultimate guide to a snowmobile's value is what else can you buy for the same amount of money. Older snowmobiles in good condition with lower mileage tend to sell for more than book value.
- New or Used, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

Should I buy a 2 Stroke or 4 Stroke?

4 stroke engines tend to be more reliable, get better gas mileage and last longer. They are particularly popular in areas where people use them to commute to work. As a general rule, 2 Stroke snowmobiles tend to be more popular in the Pacific Northwest. You also never have to change the oil in a 2 Stroke, although you do have to add oil every time you fill it with gas. Most of the snowmobiles for sale in the Pacific Northwest are 2 Stroke. 4 Stroke or 2 Stroke, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!



Do I need a snowmobile with reverse gear?

Not all snowmobiles come with a reverse gear. If you don't have a reverse gear you will need a greater turning radius or you will be lifting the back of your snowmobile to turn around. If you have weak upper body strength or a bad back, make sure you buy a snowmobile with reverse. Reverse or No Reverse, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

Do I need a snowmobile with electric start?

Pro-riders normally don't ride snowmobiles with electric start because the starter and battery add a small amount of weight to the snowmobile. Most everyday snowmobilers prefer having a snowmobile with electric start. If you have weak upper body strength or a bad back, make sure you buy a snowmobile with electric start. This is especially important on any snowmobile with over 600cc. Pull start or electric start, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

Air cooled or water cooled?

Almost all snowmobiles used to be air cooled. They have a belt driven fan that cools the engine. Snowmobile manufacturers later developed water cooled engines when they wanted to increase the horsepower. Some of the manufacturers still make air cooled snowmobiles today. These are great entry level snowmobiles as they tend to be lighter, have less horsepower and also cost a lot less. Air cooled snowmobiles are highly recommended for young people who are just learning to snowmobile. Air cooled or water cooled, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

How long of a track do I need?

121, 136, 145, 153, 154, 162, 163, and 172 are some of the common track sizes

As a general rule the longer the snowmobile the less likely you are to get stuck in deep snow. Also, the longer the snowmobile, the harder it will be to maneuver especially if you are a beginner or don't have a lot of upper body strength. Ski Doo makes the 172 snowmobile and it is extremely long. If you are going to go off a groomed trail into the powder a 145 to 154 length is normally preferred for a beginner. Short track or long track, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

What type of snowmobile do I want?

The most common types are touring, trail, crossover, and mountain snowmobiles. You will want to purchase the type of snowmobile designed for the type of riding you plan on doing. All of these types can be used for beginners.

• Touring snowmobiles are designed for 2 riders. They are a lot heavier and

are not recommended for off trail use as they will easily get stuck in deep snow.

- Trail snowmobiles are designed for groomed trails. They usually have shorter track lengths and a wider ski stance which make them more stable going around corners than the crossover and mountain snowmobiles.
- Crossover snowmobiles are designed to be good on trails and on the mountain. They also have a softer and more comfortable ride than mountain snowmobiles.
- Mountain snowmobiles are designed for deep powder and are least likely to get stuck in deep snow, but because of their longer tracks and narrower ski stance they are slightly more difficult to handle on groomed trails.

Touring, Trail, Crossover or Mountain, any snowmobile you buy will make your smile!



How big of an engine do I need?

When it comes to snowmobiling bigger is not always better, especially if you are new to the sport. Here are some general rules to consider about engine size and horsepower:

- The larger the engine the more the snowmobile weighs. The more your snowmobile weighs the easier it is to get stuck if you are a beginner.
- Less horsepower means longer engine life and less maintenance.
- Less horsepower is a lot safer and better when you are learning to ride.
- Less horsepower equals better fuel economy

During the last 10 years most snowmobiles were either 600cc or 800cc. Many new riders have had minor accidents with 800cc snowmobiles simply because of the extra horsepower. Most experienced snowmobilers don't let their inexperienced friends ride their 800cc snowmobile for this reason. Most 600cc snowmobiles also cost less than most 800cc snowmobiles. Small engine or big engine, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

What brand of snowmobile is the best?

If you join your local snowmobile club, this will be a never-ending topic of discussion, kidding and laugher! Arctic Cat, Polaris, Ski Doo and Yamaha are the current snowmobile manufacturers.

- Every piece of machinery or equipment can break down and will need proper maintenance. Having a dealer close to you is a huge plus when you need parts or repair for your snowmobile.
- All 4 brands currently make really good snowmobiles. The differences between them are generally very slight and unless you are a pro-rider you will most likely not be able to tell the difference.
- Even among the pro-riders the differences in the brands tend to be more of a personal preference than anything.

Arctic Cat, Polaris, Ski Doo or Yamaha, any snowmobile you buy will make you smile!

Important things to consider:

- Join your local snowmobile club to optimize your snowmobile experience and learn how to ride like a pro.
- If you don't have a valid Drivers License you will need a Snowmobile Operators Permit to operate a snowmobile in Oregon. To get a permit you

will need to take a class sponsored by your local snowmobile club or Oregon State Snowmobile Association. If your child is old enough to read and comprehend they can usually qualify for a Snowmobile Operators Permit.

- Helmets are not required for snowmobiles in Oregon but you will rarely see anyone without a helmet. Helmets not only protect your head, but also help keep your warm.
- Snowmobile trail maps are available from your local snowmobile club and the Forest Service.
- Insurance is not required but is highly recommended. Full coverage is relatively inexpensive and will help to protect your investment. Even if you don't want full coverage for your snowmobile, liability insurance is a must!
- Water cooled snowmobiles can overheat if you are operating at very slow speeds or on hard packed snow or ice. Overheating will destroy your snowmobile. Be sure your snowmobile has ice scratchers and learn how to use them.
- Still have questions? Come to our next club meeting (you don't have to be a member to attend) and ask a question and enjoy all the answers you get from all the "experts" in our club. It's fun, possibly hilarious, and you won't regret it!

Finally, your local snowmobile club spends countless volunteer hours maintaining and grooming the snowmobile trails with equipment and funding provided by the Oregon State Snowmobile Association. Membership in most clubs is usually \$60 a year or less for your whole family and includes a \$35 membership in the Oregon State Snowmobile Association. Volunteering is not required to be a member, but you can still show your support by joining today. You'll be glad you did!

SNOWMOBILING DO'S & DON'TS

SNOWMOBILING DO'S

- Know the local hazards and forecasted weather conditions.
- Understand the importance of protective equipment and proper clothing while riding a snowmobile.
- Be alert and constantly scan the trail or riding area for other snowmobiles, trail users, and hazards.
- Ride defensively, be courteous, and use common sense.
- Follow the rules of the road and abide by all trail signs.
- Steer clear of restricted areas and respect environmentally sensitive areas.
- Know the operational characteristics of the snowmobile, along with its capacities and limitations: vehicle's range based upon normal fuel capacity and consumption, stopping ability/distance, maneuverability/steering capability, ability in deep snow, ability on steep side slopes, etc.
- Respect the rights of all other winter recreationists.
- Obey posted speed limits.
- Know the assumed risks and potential consequences of careless or reckless behavior while riding a snowmobile, including the potential for fines or injury.

SNOWMOBILING DON'TS

- Do not operate at high speeds, especially when near houses, buildings, livestock, wildlife, trailheads, or other recreationists.
- Do not use alcohol or drugs.
- Do not engage in reckless, careless, or inappropriate behavior.
- Do not overload a snowmobile or ride double unless the snowmobile is designed for 2 passengers.
- Do not get too close to other snowmobiles or other recreationists.
- Do not operate the snowmobile in areas with limited snow cover or on bare ground.
- Do not disturb wildlife or livestock.
- Do not ignore sudden changes in weather conditions.
- Do not disobey local, state/provincial, or federal snowmobile rules, regulations, and policies.
- Do not allow the snowmobile rental unit to be operated by anyone who has not completed the required rental orientation, training, and rental agreement documentation.
- Do not disobey rental company guidelines, instructions, or policies.





"Rules of the Road" for Snowmobilers

Do not follow closely behind trail groomers: It takes about one hour after grooming for the snow surface to properly "set up".

Always ride in a straight line on groomed trails: Spinning and sliding around leaves ruts and soft spots in trails — play areas are provided for these activities.

Always ride on the right hand side of trails: Especially on narrow trails and around blind curves.

Use hand signals for slowing, stopping or turning off of trails: For your own safety and the safety of others on the trail.

Adjust speed to visibility: You should be able to stop short of any obstruction or emergency within your range of eyesight.

Do not stop in the middle of a trail: Others may not see you in time to avoid a collision. If you must stop — pull to the right edge of the trail.

Always use your headlights: Your headlight must be on at all times.

Do not use drugs or alcohol: Drunk driving laws apply the same as they do on the highway.

Do not go out alone: Always ride in pairs or groups and inform someone where you will be riding and the estimated time of your return.

Ride cautiously in Sno-Parks, near lodges and crossing highways: 5 MPH speed limit in snow park. Obstacles and pedestrians can emerge very suddenly in congested areas.

Avoid "showing off" near Sno-Parks and lodges: You are most likely to be observed by opponents to motorized recreation in these areas and the image you project is very important to the future of your sport.

Look out for cross-country skiers, sled dog teams, ATV's and groomers that may be on the trails at any time: Slow to 10 MPH, pass cautiously and make the effort to be friendly and courteous.

Avoid the use of loud mufflers: Noise projects a very bad image of motorized recreation.

Reduce the noise to a minimum between 10:00pm and 6:00am in the Sno-parks: These parks are used by all types of recreationists – not just snowmobilers.

Always dress appropriately for adverse weather: Helmets are required at all times. Base temperature at 300 travelling at 30 MPH, the wind chill factor is 00. At 60 MPH the wind chill factor is -200.

Always be prepared: Carry extra spark plugs, belts and tools. Carry drinking water, snacks, extra socks,

gloves, waterproof matches, space blanket and compass.

Know the area in which you are riding: Acquire a trail map from the local forest service or snowmobile club. Even better, join the local snowmobile club and don't hesitate to ask questions.

Observe and comply with posted areas: Just one set of tracks in the wilderness can last until the next snowfall and leave a telltale sign for opponents to motorized sports to pinpoint for arguments for land closures.

Be aware of snow depth: Do not ride on muddy trails. Avoid damaging soil or vegetation, but preserve it for others to enjoy. Leave no trace.

Avalanche: There are a few slopes in our area that have potential for sliding. When in doubt – avoid questionable slopes.

Licensing & Permits: Anyone operating a snowmobile on public land is required to carry a valid driver's license or snowmobile permit.

Pre-Season Snowmobile Check List

When the leaves start to turn to red and gold - it's a good time to drag out your sled and blow off the dust. Fall is a good time for maintenance - you can take your time to ensure you covered everything. Once the snow starts to fly you'll be ready to go. Check with your operators manual for special instructions regarding adjustments, lubrication, follow all safety suggestions.

Below is a simple check list to look over prior to starting the season:

- **#I BRAKES** Check proper setting, free operation, and look for worn brakes.
- #2 CLUTCH Check lubrication
- **#3 CHAIN** Check lubrication and examine chain tension
- #4 TRACK Examine for broken cleats, loose or torn drive holes, and ply separation. Check alignment.
- **#5 HYFAXES** Check for wear or damage replace if necessary.
- #6 SKIS Check alignment and examine for loose weld joints, or loose or worn out wear rods.
- **#7 IGNITION** Check sparks plugs, carburetor-fuel, replacement of fuel filter and check fittings.
- **#8 DRIVE BELT** Check for wear and cracks. Measure old belt and compare to specifications.
- **#9** LIGHTS Replace burned out bulbs, apply brakes and check stoplights.
- **#10 SPARE PARTS/TOOLS** Pack lights bulbs, spare belt, tools (pliers, adjustable wrench, screwdrivers) and starter pull rope.
- **#IIWHEELS** Check wheel condition and lubrication, axel wheels and bearings. Look for loose nuts and bolts, broken welds and springs.

• Your Trailer Should be Ready Too

- #1 Make sure the tires are in good shape (check the spare also), and wheel bearings are greased.
- #2 Check all the lights and connections.
- #3 Carry a few extra bulbs and parts to be safe.

• Extra Things to Pack

Take your owners manual, emergency survival kit, siphon hose, duct tape, tow rope, extra bogie wheel.

• Then get out there and RIDE!!!
